From the pastor...

With the arrival of summer, the long running debate begins again about what is appropriate summer dress for Church. It is a contest between comfort and modesty. Also involved is the more contemporary question of what constitutes appropriate dress for Church in general. The dean of the Vanderbilt Divinity School has said: "...two competing trends reflect deep, deep divisions in how you dress for the God you go to worship. Either you come as you are before a less formal, more accessible God, or you dress up for a God who is honored by your Sunday best." Church is both, a place for the community to gather and a sacred place of prayer. It is not easy to balance the two. But perhaps we can all consciously make an effort to achieve a balance.

The room for discretion is a little narrower for those serving in community and liturgical roles, such as Greeter, Usher, Reader, and Extraordinary Minister of the Eucharist. It is best to choose not to wear shorts or tops that in the context of ministry, may appear immodest or lacking in respect for the dignity of liturgical action. "Flip flops" raise an insurance question. With the steps, smooth stone floors, and oriental carpets, there is a serious tripping hazard. St. Francis wore sandals, but sandals have straps over the heels that make for more secure footing.

I commend all to their best and sincere judgment about summer Church dress.
